1. Coordinated School Health Advisory Committee. The Coordinated School Health Advisory Committee

meets at least twice annually in October and April. At meetings, the committee discusses and makes recommendations in the seven areas that make up coordinated school health:

- 1. comprehensive school health education
- 2. opportunities for physical activity for students that include physical education
- 3. school nursing and other health services
- 4. healthy school environment
- 5. school-site health promotion for staff
- 6. school nutrition services
- 7. school counseling, psychological, and social services

2. Coordinated School Health Mission: The Orchard Farm School District, in cooperation with families, community agencies, district staff, and students will work together to achieve optimal levels of wellness through the Coordinated School Health Program. This program will coordinate the delivery of comprehensive health services, physical and health education, and nutritious food choices in the school environment.

3. Coordinated School Health Vision: The Orchard Farm School District, recognizing that students and staff need to be healthy to learn, and need to learn to be healthy, has a vision of health and education working together at the district level to meet the health and education needs of students and staff.

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5. MSIP-IV Standards and Indicators for Coordinated School Health

8.12: The district has developed and implemented a program for school health services which includes goals and objectives, service activities, and an evaluation design.

Indicator 1. The district has a written health services plan and health care services which include:

• Goals and measurable objectives aligned with the CSIP and student performance data.

- The Coordinated School Health program is aligned with CSIP Goal #3: Facility, Support and Instructional Services.
- Measurable Objective #1: Orchard Farm R-5 School District will provide and maintain facilities conducive to the best learning environment and opportunities for its students.
- Measurable Objective #2: Orchard Farm R-5 School District will provide sufficient support resources conducive to the best learning environment and opportunities for its students.),

• Program evaluation criteria and procedures:

The Orchard Farm School District Coordinated School Health Program is evaluated annually during the month of January. The evaluation report is compiled and written by the Director of Special Services and is submitted to the Board of Education at the regular January meeting. All aspects of coordinated school health are reported and evaluated, including comprehensive school health education, opportunities for physical activity for students that include physical education, school nursing and other health services, healthy school environments, school-site health promotion for staff, school nutrition services, and school counseling, psychological, and social services. The Board of Education approves the report and evaluation.

• Board-approved written policies on the administration of medication, contagious and infectious diseases, immunization for school children, confidentiality of health records, and child-abuse reporting):

Orchard Farm School District Board Policy JHCD requires procedures for the administration of prescription and over-the-counter drugs, including herbal preparations, vitamins, and substances that claim or purport to be medicinal or performance enhancing. Medications must be prescribed by an authorized prescriber and administered by a district nurse, or under the supervision of the nursing office. Students are not allowed to self-administer medications while at school. Students with appropriate documentation from a physician and parent permission may carry emergency medication such as an epi-pen or an asthma inhaler.

Orchard Farm School District Board Policy JHC requires that students with contagious diseases be excluded from attendance. This policy also requires the confidentiality of student health records.

Orchard Farm School District Board Policy JHCB requires that students be immunized as required by law, unless formally exempted for religious or medical reasons.

Missouri law currently requires students entering kindergarten or 1st grade to have a vision examination by a licensed optometrist or ophthalmologist, unless the parents request in writing to opt out. This law is enforced by the Orchard Farm School District nurses.

School Board Policy JHG requires district staff members to comply with the state child abuse and neglect laws and the mandatory reporting of suspected neglect and/or abuse. Staff members who suspect neglect or abuse will report to the school principal or his/her designee (often the school counselor, but sometimes the district social worker), and the principal or designee will make a report via the Child Abuse Hotline to the Children's Division, as required by law.

• Procedures for first aid and emergency care (including accident-reporting procedures) and records of students served:

Orchard Farm School District has procedures in place for first aid and emergency care.

In the case of a student accident or injury, a Student Injury Report Form must be completed and forwarded to the nursing office, the personnel office, and the office of the Director of Special Services. Accident forms are kept on file until the student has reached the age of 23. At that time, the accident forms are destroyed, according the requirements of the Public School Records Retention Schedule published by the Missouri Secretary of State. In the case of a staff accident or injury, a Staff Injury Report Form must be completed and forwarded to the nursing office, the personnel office, and the office of the Director of Special Services. Staff must indicate if they accept or refuse a Workers Compensation claim, and if refused, must state the reason.

Injury Report Forms are located under staff resources on the district website.

Emergency care procedures vary based on the nature of the medical emergency. Training in first aid, CPR, and the use of AED equipment has been provided to selected staff and 41 are currently certified. Of those certified in CPR/AED, 29 are transportation employees. In August 2011, training in allergy prevention and response, and standard precautions was provided to all staff as required by Board Policy JHCF. This training included the use of epi-pens. In addition, selected staff received training for response to seizures.

• Procedures for maintaining up-to-date cumulative health records including immunization records and emergency contact information:

As required by Board Policy JHC, the nursing office at Orchard Farm School District maintains student health records, including the maintenance of emergency information forms for each student. Emergency information forms are updated at least annually. As a part of each student's health record, nursing staff keep a log of clinic visits. The records are retained and/or destroyed based on the Missouri Public School Records Retention Schedule.

• Procedures for providing comprehensive health screenings, making referrals for identified health problems, and sharing information with parents/guardians:

Beginning July 1, 2008 (167.194 RSMo), every child enrolling in kindergarten or first grade in a public elementary school in Missouri shall receive one comprehensive vision examination performed by a state licensed optometrist or physician. Orchard Farm School District nurses School District Nurses conduct vision and hearing screening for all students entering kindergarten, and for students entering 1st grade who have never attended kindergarten. All students in grades 1, 3, 5, and 7 receive a vision screening through UMSL (For supporting data, see page 7). Students with disabilities may be screened more frequently, if needed. Parents of students who fail vision or hearing screenings are notified in writing. Students also receive hearing and vision screening per parent and/or teacher request.

If the School District Nurses suspect any type of health problem, parents are notified as soon as possible via phone call and will be notified in writing if attempts via phone are unsuccessful. Important parent contact is documented appropriately in SIS-K12.

• Procedures for monitoring students' chronic health problems and for developing strategies for addressing such problems to ensure individual students' academic progress:

Orchard Farm School District Nurses develop an individualized health plan (IHP) for all students with chronic health problems. These plans outline procedures for insuring the health and safety of the individual students while making certain that students are in the classroom during instructional times to the greatest extent appropriate. Instructions specific to individual students and their health are documented in SIS K12, along with any pertinent doctors' orders. Students could have individual health plans for lifethreatening allergies, diabetes, seizure disorders, asthma, or other serious or life-threatening conditions.

8.13: A school foods program is available which makes at least one nutritionally balanced meal available to all students each day in accordance with Federal and State Child Nutrition Program regulations and guidelines.

Indicator 1: Documentation indicates that the district's food services program is operated in accordance with all applicable regulations and guidelines.

Orchard Farm School District contracts with Chartwells to provide food service for the students (and staff). Chartwell's staff use Nutri-Kids software to insure that nutrition in all school meals meets or exceeds the guidelines provided by the state of Missouri. School cafeterias serve both breakfast and lunch, exceeding the guideline of serving at least one nutritionally balanced meal each day. For supporting data, see page 9.

8.12.2 Team Response

1. The health services plan and program **are** reviewed by a registered nurse **and** a consulting physician annually. The district employs a lead nurse and two other registered nurses and contracts with a consulting physician.

7. Supporting Data:

Area 1: Comprehensive School Health Education

Health curriculum: In accordance with the Coordinated School Health Vision of Orchard Farm School District, a guaranteed and viable health curriculum is necessary for students to "learn to be healthy". The development of health curriculum is an ongoing process involving all health and physical education teachers, and lead by the IAC Coordinator, Amanda Williams. Curriculum development includes creating and improving objectives, assessments, activities, and instructional methods, and insuring that these four components are properly aligned. Orchard Farm School District continues to improve an aligned, guaranteed and viable health curriculum. In addition to the district curriculum, Mercy Health Systems has made an additional

health resource available to students and teachers in the Orchard Farm School District. This resource is called *Health Teacher* and provides web-based activities that address a number of health curriculum objectives.

Area 2: Opportunities for Physical Activity for Students that Include Physical Education

- Legislation: In 2011, there was no new legislation impacting the provision for physical activity for students that include physical education. All district schools meet with activity requirements of SB 291, the Education Omnibus Bill, passed during the 2009 legislative session. School districts are required to provide 150 minutes of moderate physical activity per week at the elementary level, and 225 minutes of moderate physical activity per week at the middle school level. If recess is used at the elementary school to provide moderate physical activity, the school must include one recess period of at least twenty minutes per day. This legislation became effective at the beginning of the 2010-2011 school year.
- **Physical Education:** Orchard Farm School District offers a comprehensive physical education instructional program beginning in kindergarten and extending through high school. Orchard Farm High School students are required to complete 1.5 credits (three semesters) of physical education to graduate.
- **Extra- and Co-Curricular Activities:** Orchard Farm School District offers intramural and inter-scholastic sports for both boys and girls on the secondary level. Participation in high school inter-scholastic sports programs is detailed in the following chart, indicating that about half of all high school students are involved in sports:

Other activities, such as marching band, also provide opportunities for physical activity.

Area 3: School Nursing and Other Health Services

Vision Examinations and Screenings: Beginning July 1, 2008 (167.194 RSMo), every child enrolling in kindergarten or first grade in a public elementary school in Missouri shall receive one comprehensive vision examination performed by a state licensed optometrist or physician. Orchard Farm School District nurses keep necessary records to enforce this law. FY12 is the final year for this law, as it sunsets on June 30,2012, and is unlikely to be reauthorized. It is still recommended that children in kindergarten, 1st, and 3rd grades have an eye exam.

The district nurses screen the incoming kindergarten students prior to entering school and the UMSL School of Optometry (facilitated by Dr. Vinita Henry, a district resident and member of the Coordinated School Health Advisory Committee) comes every year and screens students in grades 1, 3, 5, and 7. The Lions Club comes to the Orchard Farm Preschool at Discovery Elementary and screen preschool students for amblyopia.

Vision Screening Data

Nursing Clinic Visits: Longitudinal data from the last seven years shows the numbers of clinic visits from August-December. Data indicate that the highest rate of clinic visits is at Discovery Elementary School and the lowest rate of clinic visits is in the middle school. The rate of clinic visits/student has been increasing every year since FY09, and is currently the highest it has been in the last seven years. While the rate of clinic visits has remained flat at Orchard Farm Elementary, Orchard Farm Middle School, and Orchard Farm High School when compared to last year (FY11), the rate at Discovery Elementary has increased significantly. These data are reported in the chart on page 8.

Area 4: Healthy School Environment

Staff safety on the job, as measured by the annual number of Workers' Compensation claims, is noted in the chart on page 8. In the last six years, the number of claims has ranged from 4 to 10.

The goal of the employee wellness program is to reach out to all employees to promote good health and to serve as role models to the student served by Orchard Farm School District.

For the 2011-12 school-year, 70 people signed up to participate in the employee wellness program. This year, the program consists of teams of 5 who track the miles that they walk over a week long period. On the following Monday, they tell their team captain how many miles they walked. The captain then adds up the team total and turns them in to Amanda Williams, who tracks the teams' progress throughout the year. Once every few months, the team that has consistently walked the most miles, as well as the team that has improved the most, get gift cards to *Subway* as an incentive. At the end of the year, during the Orchard Farm Second Annual 5K, the teams will celebrate their achievement by walking as a group during the race.

The Orchard Farm Second Annual 5K/1 Mile Walk will be April 21, 2012. It will be held on the main campus again this year with the 5K starting at 8:30 and the 1 Mile Walk starting at 9:30. This event is open to all Orchard Farm staff, students, and community members, and 50% of the proceeds will be donated to the American Cancer Society through the United Way.

In addition to the exercise promotions listed above, the nursing office offers a voluntary "Staff Health Inventory" program. District employees are asked to fill out a "Staff health Inventory Form". The request is made one time at the beginning of the year, and the information provided is voluntary and confidential. The information is shredded at the end of each school year.

Area 6: School Nutrition Services

Supporting Data: Using the Nutri-Kids Program, menus for each level (elementary and secondary) are balanced each week (combined lunch/breakfast) to meet or exceed the following nutrition guidelines:

Orchard Farm School District exceeds the guidelines for total fat (<30%) and saturated fat (<10%), and is in 100% compliance with drink guidelines.

For the 2011-2012 school year, Chartwells is continuing promotion campaigns to help students learn about nutrition and healthy food choices. The district is moving towards Obama's Healthier US Challenge recommendations at the elementary level, by offering only balanced choice snacks, eliminating most desserts, and offering more fresh fruits and vegetables as part of the meals. The students are offered balance choice breakfast and lunch options at the secondary level, as well as fresh salads and wraps. Fresh fruits and vegetables are also used to complete secondary meals.

Area 7: School Counseling, Psychological, and Social Services

School Counseling: School counselors have provided some guidance curriculum and some responsive services in the form of small group counseling during calendar 2011. Counseling groups provided to students were as follows:

Social Services: Orchard Farm School District continues the partnership with Crider Center through the School-Based Mental Health Specialist program, though there has been significant personnel turn-over in the last two years. At the beginning of 2010, Pam Smalley, SBMHS, was promoted by Crider Center, and her position was filled by Kevin Scobey. Mr. Scobey resigned in August 2010, and the position was assumed by Tracy Birkenbine. In September, 2011, Mrs. Birkenbine resigned, and Crider recently hired Kristina Kersting to fill the position. During 2011, the School-Based Mental Health Specialists worked with 14 students from Orchard Farm School District and their families. Ms. Kersting currently has a full caseload of 16 families. Students on the SBMHS caseload must have a medically diagnosed mental health condition.

In addition to the School-Based Mental Health Specialist, Orchard Farm School District provides social work services to students and their families through the District Social Worker, Tara Olendorff. Ms. Olendorff worked with 97 students and their families during 2011.

Through the social work office, fifteen Discovery and Orchard Farm Elementary students are participating in Operation Back Pack. This program is affiliated with Operation Food Search, and provides a back pack of food every weekend during the school year to feed the student over the weekend.

Orchard Farm continues the partnership with Preferred Family Health Care, Team of Concern, to work with students who are at-risk for substance abuse. During 2011, 17 Orchard Farm secondary students were assisted by the Team of Concern.

Crisis counseling is provided to students following traumatic incidents on the Orchard Farm campus, or involving Orchard Farm students or staff. In the fall of 2011, crisis counseling was provided after a car accident involving students, the cancer diagnosis of a fourth grade student, and to students when friends or acquaintances were arrested and/or incarcerated, and/or experienced crises with substance abuse. .
